



2. [about 5 minutes] Read Revelation 20. It is suggested that different readers take 20:1-3, 20:4-6, 20:7-10 and 20:11-15.

1. [about 5 minutes] How do you see the tension between good and evil playing out in the world at the moment?

The 'thousand years', or the 'millennium', is mentioned only seven times in the New Testament. Six of these are in Revelation 20. In spite of this limited data, the concept has spawned many divergent views. Leon Morris counsels 'we approach the chapter with humility and charity'. As you discuss the different options, keep this in mind.

The thousand years—actual or metaphor? (20:2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7)
In Revelation 20, does anything make you think the thousand years is a literal 1,000 years? Is there anything to make you think it is metaphorical, standing for a certain period of time; if so, why has one thousand been specified? See 2 Peter 3:8. [about 8 minutes]

The thousand years—when is it? (20:1-10) [about 8 minutes]
There are several views on when the thousand years is.

- before Jesus' return (*post-millennial*)
- after Jesus' return (*pre-millennial*)
- since Jesus' death, before his return; so, now (*amillennial*)
- don't care (*pan-millennial* — it will all pan out in the end!)

What support do you see Revelation 20 giving to each of these views?

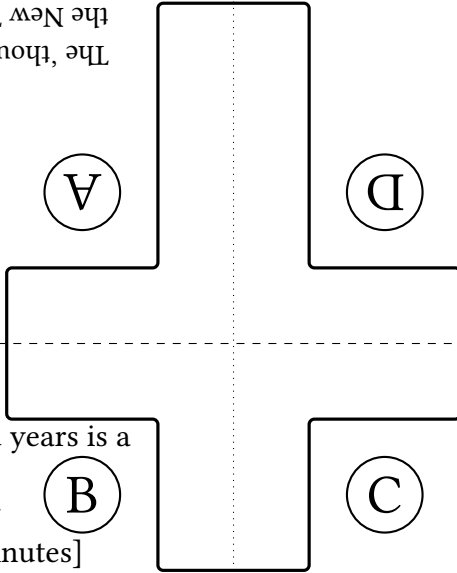
The first resurrection—what is it? (20:4) [about 4 minutes]
Different views on 'the first resurrection': Jesus' resurrection; when someone becomes a Christian; when Christian believers are raised.

What support do you see Revelation 20 giving to each of these views? (Note: there is no mention of 'second resurrection'.)

The second death—what is it? (20:6) [about 4 minutes]
(Note: no mention is made of 'first death'.)
