Though in very nature God, he emptied himself of glory, living and dying as a man. Yet God exalted him to the highest place. Next, Jesus will return in glory and the dwelling place of God will be with His people. When we find Jesus we find hope. Finding Hope is a doctrinal series on the return of Jesus, and finding the reality of Christian hope.

This 4 week series and studies will explore the doctrine of the return of Jesus and the renewal of heaven and earth, giving us a frame work to understand what the bible says about His return. Listen to the sermons that accompany these studies online at <u>figtree.church/sermons</u>.

4. Why is His death and resurrection vital for the claims Jesus has made about himself? Why is this essential for Him?

Read Ephesians 1:3, Ephesians 2:6-7, and John 16:1-7

- 5. Can you think of some ways that the Ascension of Jesus changes the relationship between God and humanity?
- 6. Think about the phrase 'eternal life'.
 - a. When does eternal life begin?
 - b. What might be different between 'eternal life' and 'living forever'?
 - c. What does eternal life mean for those who die in Christ?
 (see 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18, Luke 23:40-43 and 2 Peter 1:12-15)

- Why might we think of the return of Jesus as our great hope? (See 1 Peter 1:3-7)
- 8. Do you have some important questions about the return of Jesus that you would like to make note of?

with Jesus? (You may like to see the following for some things that can knock us of track: Hebrews 12:1-4, Titus 1:10-12, 2 Timothy 3:1-5, 2 Thessalonians 3:11-14, Galatians 5:16-21)
